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FINAL RITES READ FOR THREE WHO PASS ON DURING WEEK

COMMUNITY SADDENED BY LOSSES.

Mrs. C. F. Gardiner, Umatilla; John A. Graybeal, Irrigon; Albert F. Hedwall, Hermiston; Answer Call

Three people, well known in Hermiston, were called by death this week, and will have been laid to rest before the week has passed. The community has been saddened by these losses and has expressed its sympathy in many ways.

Mrs. C. F. Gardiner.

Final rites for Mrs. C. F. Gardiner were read Tuesday afternoon by Rev. O. W. Payne at the Methodist church when many people crowded the church to pay tribute to a friend and associate who had been a bright spot among their acquaintances. The body was taken to Echo where interment was made.

Mrs. Gardiner passed away suddenly at her home in Umatilla Saturday night. Her death was said to have been caused by acute dilatation of the heart, from oedema of the lungs, due to inhalation of smoke from burning steak, which irritated an asthmatic condition. She had been in Hermiston practically all day Saturday and had returned to her home about six o'clock in the evening when the severe attack was recognized. She passed away about eleven o'clock.

Mrs. Gardiner was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. N. W. Bloom of Hermiston, and was born in Fort Wayne, Indiana, 1897, where she lived until 1918. Her parents moved to Hermiston that year and eight years later she was married to C. F. Gardiner of Umatilla, where she has since made her home. Mr. Gardiner is an inspector in the Union Pacific shops there.

She is survived by her husband, her parents, Mr. and Mrs. N. W. Bloom of Hermiston, and one brother, Wilbur K. Bloom of Seattle.

Albert F. Hedwall.

Albert F. Hedwall, 32, son of Mr. and Mrs. G. F. Hedwall, passed away at the Hermiston hospital early Wednesday morning. Funeral services will be held in Portland Saturday at 3:00 P. M. in Pearson's Funeral Home, and interment in the Rose City cemetery. The body will be at Pearson's Funeral Parlor until 4:00 o'clock Friday afternoon.

Albert F. Hedwall was born in Portland, December 28, 1900, where he lived until he was 17 years of age, when he moved to Hermiston with his parents. He graduated from the Hermiston Union high school with the class of '21. During his high school days he participated in many school activities, using his talent as a cartoonist and imitator. The key to the high school that now hangs in the assembly was carved by Albert.

As a boy he was always very energetic and after graduating he was employed by Arthur Adamson who then managed the local theatre. From here he went with Mr. Adamson to Enterprise, Ore., where he continued in the show business.

Later he moved to Portland where he was employed by the Northwest Electric company for two years, before joining with the Producers & Distributors corporation which soon merged with the Pathe film exchange. In this position he served as a display man, often originating designs for posters, until a year ago last April when he was forced to give up his work because of failing health.

He is survived by his parents Mr. and Mrs. G. F. Hedwall, two brothers, M. G. and Herbert Hedwall, two sisters, Mrs. R. C. McReynolds and Margaret Hedwall, all of Hermiston.

John A. Graybeal, 75, of Irrigon, died at the Hermiston hospital Tuesday, October 31, following a prolonged illness. Funeral services were held Thursday afternoon at Irrigon with Rev. O. W. Payne of Hermiston reading the ceremony. Interment was in the Irrigon cemetery.

BRILLIANT PASSING WINS FOOTBALL GAME FOR BULLDOGS

HEPPNER TAKES TRIMMING IN 12-0 SCORE FRIDAY.

Unexpected Plays High Spots in Game; Return Game Scheduled at Arlington November 11.

The Hermiston Bulldogs led by Coach Cochran defeated Heppner on their own field last Friday by a score of 12 to 0. The Hermiston team played a brand of football seldom seen in high school teams. This was the first loss for Heppner this season.

The Hermiston line made holes in the opponents line big enough to drive a wagon through, and the Hermiston backs took good advantage of it. The playing field was in line shape and both made some big gains at times.

Hermiston had Heppner backed against their goal line four times. Twice Hermiston had the ball on Heppner's one yard line but could not put it across, and at no time during the game was Hermiston's goal line threatened.

In the first quarter Heppner kicked to Hermiston. Harris took the ball on his 25-yard line and advanced it to his own 40 yard line. On the next play Harris made eight yards through left tackle, and on the next down made a first down on Heppner's 43 yard line. On this first down Hermiston was penalized fifteen yards for hurdling.

First down and 25 yards to go. Harris punted to the Heppner 12 yard line. Heppner fumbled the ball and Pierce retained it for Hermiston. On the first down Harris made four yards through left tackle, and three yards more through the line. On the next play Reeves made a first down on the Heppner one yard line and smashed through on the next play for a touchdown. Try for point failed.

The next two quarters saw Heppner fighting hard to protect their goal, which held Hermiston from putting the ball across.

In the middle of the fourth quarter Heppner punted to Hermiston on the Heppner 40 yard line. With smashing line plays and end runs, Hermiston advanced the ball to the Heppner five yard line. First down and five yards to go for a touchdown. Heppner was off side and Hermiston took the ball on Heppner's one yard line. The next play failed to make gain. Second down and one yard to go.

Hermiston was off side in the next play and were penalized five yards. Still second down and the goal to go. It looked like Hermiston was stopped. The ball snapped to (Continued on Page 4)

FORAGE CROPS DISCUSSED AT FARM BUREAU MEETING

At a Umatilla Farm Bureau meeting held in the Hermiston Union church Saturday night H. K. Dean, superintendent of the Umatilla field station, lead the discussion of the temporary nature of forage crops raised in the district this year. It was brought out that these temporary emergency crops would not replace stable alfalfa crops.

Various speakers emphasized these points. They were J. Jendrzewski, Chas. Lynch, A. E. Bense, and Assistant County Agent G. D. Best. Mr. Best discussed the feeding values of the different crops raised on the project this year. He said that the best policy for the farmer to follow was "to get hay land back into a winter hardy type of alfalfa, and pasture back into good perennial grass, on which sweet clover should be included."

A fair representation was present at the meeting.

MRS. J. SKOVBO PLACES IN NATIONAL JELLY MAKING CONTEST

Mrs. J. Skovbo of Hermiston placed seventh in a national jelly making contest sponsored by the Household Magazine which is published in Topeka, Kansas. Mrs. Skovbo won on one of the glasses of jelly which placed first at the Umatilla project fair this year. She was one of 5,842 entries made from every state in the union. Mrs. Skovbo is noted for her cooking, special delicacies made with honey.
