Controversy vs. Education.

The public controversy between Roscoe C. Nelson, president of the state board of higher education, and Wayne L. Morse, dean of the University of Oregon law school, which resulted in the resignation of a man in the highest authority in that establishment, has put the department of higher education in Oregon again on "the spot." It is a situation that should be handled sternly and without consideration of personalities, if education is to be saved from ruin by controversy.

The rivalry between the two great educational institutions does not cause these ugly echoes. It is both natural and healthy for such rivalry to exist, but it is the entrance of business and political interests that has been responsible for such bitterness and rivalry. The charge made by Morse, that faculty members of the university had not been consulted upon matters of vital importance, may be taken with a grain of salt due to the fact that Chancellor Kerr may be reached at all times when matters of importance are to be discussed, and does not have the time to "run after" faculty members and deans to get their sanction of this or that detail. It is a big job to direct two such large institutions even with the aid of a board of education, and Dr. Kerr has done his job well.

Will there ever be a solution? Not until the state board of higher education is composed of friends who can remain steadfast to the cause of higher education and ignore objections aroused by outside interests. Most of the present board members are the governor's appointees; one man refused a position on the board because of previous lack of harmony and it is now revealed that such discord is still prevalent. It is doubtful if the governor can do anything

about it. Chancellor Kerr is a veteran in education and is not one to lie down and be crushed by an onrush of criticism. At the time of his appointment an out-state man was considered for the position, but the belief was that a man who had grown up with the system of higher education in Oregon would be better able to meet and handle emergencies that were bound to arise in the future. Consequently Dr. Kerr was appointed, and he is meeting this emergency calmly and sanely.

He Had Vision

Chancellor Kerr is evidently having the same sort of trouble at Eugene he had for a time at Corvallis when he became president of the state college many years ago. It was a common saying at the time that after Dr. Kerr took charge faculty members "had to go to work."

Some of them did not like the new deal nor did alumni members. A revolt was staged at the alumni association meeting in 1910 and a "powerful committee" was named to tell the president and regents where to head in. They did so but were soon convinced that Dr. Kerr was right and the alumni objectors wrong.

The "ruinous policy" complained about at that time was the Olmsted plan for the campus. It was designed by a great architect and it was the period of years, that gave the college the splendid campus arrangement that is now the envy of other institutions all over the nation.

In 1910 many excellent people thought that what was proposed was little short of murder on the high seas and they made the welkin ring with their protests, not really understanding what it was all about.
