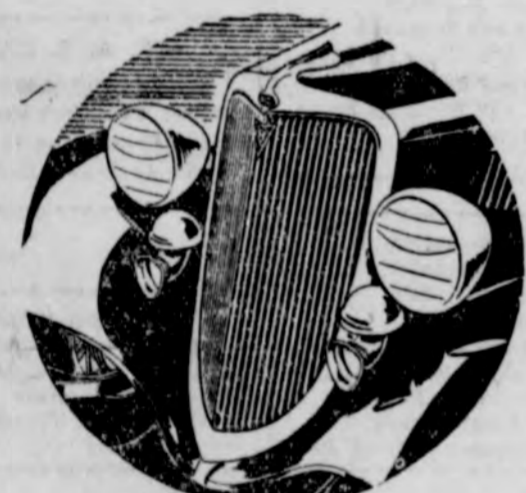
are at this time under the necessity of receiving clothing materials from their federal or state government.
