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**A Consistent Policy.**

The decision handed down by Judge L. G. Lewellyn of the Marion county circuit court declaring the Knox liquor control law constitutional will cancel the temporary restraining order against enforcement of the act, in force during the time a suit was pending by the city of Klamath Falls, alleging the law unconstitutional because it violated the home rule giving cities the right to regulate alcoholic traffic.

The question has been raised as to the city having dry ordinances or charter provisions and the effect of such legislation upon the commission. This was the problem the local city council faced, but has now been released from that responsibility since the court decision in favor of the Knox liquor control law and under the provision in the bill any such provisions existing at the time of the adoption of the bill by the legislature were abrogated. The commission will, however, respect any such local option which might be voiced in the future either by vote or popular expression.

Applicants for designation as agents of the commission in small communities the population of Hermiston and larger, where state liquor stores will not be located, are being subjected to thorough investigation. City councils, county officials, law enforcement agencies, chambers of commerce, ministerial associations and various leading citizens in each community are being asked pointed questions of the various applicants. If any organization or individual has an objection to be voiced it should be sent in immediately, or through some local organization.

The City of Hermiston has law enforcement agencies that will be strict in the maintenance of order and it is the logical center for an agency in the west end of Umatilla county. But before an agency is established in any city the qualifications of each applicant will be thoroughly checked in each instance.

Although the city charter carries a dry ordinance, it would seem a contradictory policy for the city council not to apply for a liquor agency in Hermiston. Liquor will be obtainable in other towns and the individual who wishes to consume such beverages will buy them whether there is an agency in his resident city or in another city. It is also generally believed that better order will be obtained when "hard"

Liquor is sold within the city than when it is brought in. The policy being followed by the city council, seems a consistent one.
