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Hail, Swimmers!

The appointment of a committee that would work out a program which would result in the construction of a community swimming pool was a very timely move on the part of officers of the Parent-Teachers association at its meeting Wednesday night.

A number of years ago such a move was started but was never carried to completion due to changing conditions and lack of proper support. Now is the time to carry such a project through with a possibility of securing federal funds for labor costs.

Post offices for which the examination will be held in Oregon include: Freewater, Hermiston, Jordan Valley, Linnton, Madras, Milton, Saint Benedict, Sandy, and Walla Walla.

Receipt of applications will close Friday, February 16. Interested parties are instructed to apply at the post office in this place, or to the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C., for application Form 10, and Forms 2223 and 2358 showing the places of examination and containing other definite information.

The post office department will not appoint to the position of postmaster any of the following: the husband or wife of a rural carrier; a person concerned in a contract for carrying the mails, either as contractor, sub-contractor, or surety, nor any member of his immediate family.
