## DAIRYMEN RE-ELECT FOUR DIRECTORS AT ANNUAL MEET

(Continued from Page 1) alfalfa grown and 1939 tons of other hay. He pointed out that the farmer or dairyman who feeds alfalfa hay gets 10.6 per cent protein, while the dairyman who feeds other hay gets 3.4 per cent protein. This comparison shows that the dairyman who feeds well will get the better production from his herd.

Mr. Dean explained that tests were being made at the station to determine the economic limit of feeding concentrates.

## Dairy Officials Sneak

Paul Adams, manager of the Oregon Dairy Council, of Portland, embarked upon the "new deal" in marketing dairy products and in the dairy industry in general. He explained the campaign now under way to educate the producer in the value of his own product, and stated that the per capita consumption of butter is lower in the small towns and communities than it is in the cities.

G. A. Brown, manager of Interstate Associated Creameries, of Portland, of which the local creamery is a member, contributed the success of the association partially to the cooperation of the producer, who has been forced to take an interest in the marketing of his product to affect his own advancement during the past three years.

Mr. Brown severely criticized Max Gehlhar, director of agriculture in Oregon, for his stand on the butter marketing agreement, against the purpose of the Oregon Agricultural Adjustment Act, passed by the last legislature. He urged producers to write to Governor Meier and to state senators and representatives voicing their wish in the matter.
