FUNERAL SERVICES FOR MRS. SULLIVAN ARE HELD MONDAY

SUFFERED FROM LINGERING ILLNESS SINCE 1927.

Came West From Wisconsin in 1867, And to Hermiston Locality in Year 1907.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock for Mrs. P. P. Sullivan from the Prann Funeral Parlors. Mrs. Sullivan passed away Saturday afternoon at the Hermiston hospital where she had been quite ill for several days. The final rites were read by Rev. O. W. Payne and interment made in the Hermiston cemetery.

Mrs. Sullivan was 66 years of age and had been in poor health since 1927, but at the time of her death it was thought that she was somewhat improved.

Clara Jones was born at Highland, Wisconsin, August 8, 1867. She was the daughter of Daniel and Elizabeth Jones and the youngest of eleven children; 8 brothers and two sisters. Of these, one sister, Mrs. William Carr of Montford, Wisconsin, and two brothers, Robert Jones of Milford, Iowa, and Henry Jones of Montford, Wisconsin, survive.

She was married to P. P. Sullivan, January 10, 1886, and to them were born six children; one died in infancy. They lived in Highland until 1890 when they moved to Lawler, Iowa, where they resided until 1907. In the latter part of November in that same year they came west as far as Hermiston and have made their home here since that time.

Besides her husband she is survived by two daughters and three sons, and nine grandchildren. The daughters are: Mrs. A. D. Jones of Portland and Mrs. Dave Mittelsdorf of Hermiston; the sons include LeRoy, now of Roseburg; Harold of Portland; and Herbert of Roseburg; the grandchildren are Ernestine, Bobby and Allen Sullivan; Harold Sullivan, Jr.; Maxine Sullivan; Shirley Jones; Patrick Sullivan; David and Rodney Mittelsdorf.

ARIZONA WRANGLERS ATTRACT 1600 TO HERMISTON SUNDAY

MRS. ELLA CAVINESS TRAVELS FAR TO HEAR FAVORITES.

Many People Turned Away At Theatre During Performance; Cars Line Streets.

The casual observer who visited Hermiston last Sunday would have guessed some special occasion was being celebrated from the number of people who were in town. Cars lined the streets and people milled up and down the side walk. These people had come from the four corners of Umatilla county and adjacent territory to hear the "Arizona Wranglers" who were to appear in person at the Oasis theatre.

The management of the theatre estimated that between 1500 and 1600 people were admitted to the house during the performance, and many more turned away because they could not be admitted to an earlier performance.

Mrs. Ella Caviness came from Baker, Ore., to hear the Wranglers in person, and during their first appearance the entertainers dedicated a special number to her. Mrs. Caviness is a widow and runs her own farm near Baker.
