FILM DEPICTS POLICE WORK IN NOVEL WAY.

Something new in screen depiction of police work is offered in "Bureau of Missing Persons" at the Oasis theatre Sunday only.

While there is a romantic story running through the picture, it is the brief flashes of the drama, humor and pathos enveloping a police missing persons bureau that make the picture different.

Pat O'Brien, as a hard-boiled detective, and Bette Davis as an innocent fugitive from justice carry the romantic leads. Lewis Stone gives his usual finished performance as a police captain wise in the ways of human nature.

When Pat became too handy with his fists for the robbery division, he is transferred to Stone's missing persons bureau. There he meets Bette when she comes in search of a mythical missing husband. Later it develops that Bette is wanted for the murder of the man she is seeking and suitable complications ensue before love, as usual finds a way.

Minor characters provide the kaleidoscopic drama which forms the background of the main story. Many of the incidents are taken from police records. There is the boy genius of the violin who runs away on the eve of a concert to play baseball and pal with his newly found "gang"; the wife whose husband ran away with her cook; the man who is seeking his housekeeper, "a good Christian woman," and a score more vignettes from life.


