Oregon State College, Corvallis, April 11 (Special)—Two Oregon State college students from Hermiston are listed on the scholastic honor roll for the winter term, according to a report just released by Registrar E. B. Lemon. They are Mary Brownson, sophomore in home economics and Walther Ott, senior in agriculture.

Both these students are among the eighty-seven who made an average of 2.5 grade points or above based on 20 points being perfect. Fourteen students made a straight A average.

Annual Report of Umatilla Herd Improvement Association

The annual report of the Umatilla Herd Improvement association for the year ending February 1934, has been compiled by the tester, Al Kennings. The report shows that of the 49 herds on test, 34 completed the year's test. In these herds 6896 cows were tested and 551 completed the year's test.

The average pounds of milk produced per cow, as shown in the report was 6103.2, with an average poundage of butterfat: per cow of 280.5. The average value of production per cow was \$90.59, and the average cost of roughage per cow
