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HERMISTON BASEBALL TEAM TAKES LEAGUE IN GAME SUNDAY

PENDLETON LOSES GAME TO HERMISTON, 9 TO 7.

Locals Play Fine Baseball; Four Runs Scored in Fifth; Players in Top-Notch Condition.

The Hermiston baseball team advanced into first place in the Umatilla County Baseball League when they defeated the Pendleton team 9-7 Sunday afternoon at Pendleton. The local boys played their best game so far this season when every member of the team played exceptionally well.

Pendleton started the scoring in the last of the second inning with one run. Hermiston entered the race when Henning got a hard drive through first, getting on first and scoring on Waterman's three base hit. Waterman also scored when Kopacz made a safe hit. A Pendleton player scored another run after a three base hit, tying the score at the end of the third inning.

After a scoreless fourth inning, Hermiston came back strong in the fifth and scored four runs. Getting a few safe hits, Henning, Harris and Waterman filled the bases when Kopacz came up. He hit a beautiful long fly, bringing in Henning after the fly was caught. Shafer got a hit, scoring Harris and Waterman, and also crossed the plate when the Pendleton catcher missed a ball.

The loss of two runs made in the fifth inning for Pendleton when the runs were cancelled because of failure of a Pendleton player to report to umpire, cost Pendleton the game.

Jendrzewski and Martin were on bases when Lynch knocked a long fly, scoring Jendrzewski. Martin scored on Henning's single, giving Hermiston a 8 to 2 lead at the end of the sixth.

The Hermiston boys increased their lead in the seventh with another run when Kopacz got a two base hit, scoring on Jendrzewski's line drive. The Pendleton boys, however, threw a scare on the locals in this inning when they connected with the ball and scored five runs, including the only home run of the game by McKee of Pendleton.

Waterman and Matott replaced Kopacz and Crowley for the Hermiston batteries in the eighth inning, holding the Pendleton to no runs, and victory for Hermiston.

COLONEL F. B. BOYD DIES AT ATHENA SUNDAY

Colonel F. B. Boyd, well known eastern Oregon newspaper man, and for 45 years editor of the Athena Press, died Sunday afternoon at 4:25 at his home, following a heart attack.

Born in Montavilla, Iowa, June 29, 1867, Colonel Boyd was educated at Grinnell College and 47 years ago came to Weston to be employed on the Weston Leader by Clark Wood. Colonel Boyd's marriage to Miss Louise Ridenour took place in Weston, October 19, 1890.

Forty-five years ago he bought the Athena Press, which under his editorship was imbued with the strength of his personality.

Colonel Boyd is survived by his widow; a daughter, Mrs. James Twoby of San Francisco; two sisters, Mrs. R. D. Edwards of Milton and Mrs. A. R. Little of Port Huron, Michigan, and a brother, E. H. Boyd of Port Huron.

Funeral services were held at the family home in Athena Tuesday.

DEBATERS WILL MEET MEDFORD TEAM MAY 4.

The Hermiston high school debate team will uphold the negative side of the question in a debate for the state championship with the team from Medford high school, at Corvallis, Ore., Friday, May 4, in a radio broadcast over station KOAC, at 7:30. Hermiston will represent the winners from the eastern part of the state and Medford the winners from the western part of the state.

The Medford high school has produced a winning team for the past five years. The school holds the Baker cup as a permanent award and two legs of the DeCou cup award, which they will retain permanently if they win the state championship this year. The team this year is coached by Ralph Bailey, a University of Oregon, orator.

Hermiston won from Chilcoquin in a debate at Madras Tuesday, April 17th, which entitled them to meet the champions from western Oregon.

Members of the debate teams will speak before the microphone in the music room at the state college, but will deliver their arguments to an audience, under similar conditions with which they are familiar. These instructions were received from Percy M. Collier, secretary of the Oregon High School Debating League.

SCHOLARSHIP OFFERED LOCAL STUDENT AT ALBANY COLLEGE.

Albany College—An Honor scholarship carrying full tuition at Albany College has been allotted to the Hermiston High school for the year 1934-35, it was announced today. Award of the scholarship will be in the hands of Mr. W. J. Cochran, graduate of Albany College.

Under the provisions of the scholarship, the recipient must be an honor student and capable of doing work in the college that is above average. He or she will be required to live in the dormitory for the first year.

To maintain an average standing at Albany College is not easy according to information received from the college, which indicates that at least 75 per cent of the students enrolled this year are above the average of their high schools.

DAIRY INDUSTRY PLAN SHELVED BY NATIONAL AAA OFFICIALS

DIVIDED SENTIMENT AMONG DAIRYMEN CAUSE.

Majority of National Dairymen Must Agree Before Relief Through AAA IS OBTAINED.

Divided sentiment in the dairy industry nationally has caused the administration to abandon its plan of putting into effect a benefit payment plan of production control, extension officials at Oregon State college have been notified. The decision followed study of the reports from the 15 regional dairy conferences held throughout the country.

Abandonment of the proposed plan for the present at least is in line with the fixed policy of the AAA not to attempt adjustment programs without the expressed support of a substantial majority of the industry, the announcement sets out.

A limited program of diseased cattle reduction and relief purchases financed by funds made available by congress may be carried out. The present policy of milk marketing agreements will also be continued, but no general control plan will be instituted until the industry as a whole is more nearly agreed on such a program.

The Pacific Northwest gave strong support to the proposed adjustment plan and may petition that certain portions of it be made effective in this territory, according to Dean Wm. A. Schoenfeld of O.S.C., who presided as chairman at the Portland regional meeting.

On hearing of the decision of the Washington officials Dean Schoenfeld said it is a matter of great regret that other areas did not see fit to collaborate. It is the belief of leaders here that certain phases of the plan applied locally in the Pacific northwest would be preferable to leave the situation drift, although the opinion is held here that the entire plan should be put into effect nationally.

While the Oregon, Washington and Idaho dairymen were strong in their support of the program with minor modifications, reports from many other regional meetings show that the dairy industry is sharply divided over the proposed plan. Organized opposition was encountered in many of the regional meetings where both the private and cooperative distributors opposed proposals for cutting down sales, preferring some plan of government encouraging sales promotion.

This was substantially the position taken at the California meeting, reports W. A. Lloyd, in charge of extension work in the western states, who was with the federal party at Berkeley. The delegates from Nevada, though few in number, supported the proposed AAA plan, he said.
