## GOVERNMENT TAKES FORWARD STEP IN GAME MANAGEMENT.

Because of President Roosevelt's keen interest in game and wild life conservation, which finds formal expression in the recently issued report of his committee on Wild Life Restoration, the forest service has been instructed to give more attention in the future to wild life matters, and to take a much more prominent part in the conservation of the nation's wild life resources, according to a statement just issued by regional forester C. J. Buck, of Portland, Oregon.

In line with these instructions, Dr. O. J. Murie, of the biological survey has been engaged to make a study of elk management plans on the Olympic and Snoqualmie national forests, and arrangements have been made for Game Examiner Ed. P. Cliff to work out of the regional office exclusively on game matters.

A new regulation has just been issued by the Secretary of Agriculture which is designed to enable the government to coordinate the wild life crop with other essential uses of public lands, and to manage this crop on a sustained production basis. It aims to enable the federal government to contribute more largely and directly to regulation in specific cases involving lands in government ownership which have not in the past contributed satisfactorily to the production of wild life as one of the forest crops.

## NATIONAL FLYING AWARDS WON BY O.S.C. ENGINEERS.

Three O. S. C. engineering students have been given outstanding awards for their technical accomplishments in national competition within the last few weeks. Two of these students, Don Finlay of Portland and Ray Schwartz, Myrtle Point, took first and second prizes in a national technical essay contest sponsored by the Boeing School of Aeronautics at Oakland, Cal.

Finlay, a student in aeronautical engineering at Corvallis, submitted a paper on aircraft performance calculations for which he will receive a year's course for a master pilot, valued at \$5200. Schwartz' award is for more limited instruction valued at \$1020. This is the first time two of the four national awards have been won by students in the same college.

Waldemar Schmidt, Portland, a senior in chemical engineering, has been awarded a \$250 scholarship at Massachusetts Institute of Technology to continue his studies.

## 40 TYPING TEAMS ENTERED IN O.S.C. CONTEST APRIL 28.

About 40 Oregon high schools represented by some 150 students will have teams entered in the 12th annual high school typing and shorthand transcription contest to be held by the secretarial science department at Oregon State college Saturday, April 28. The typists will be on the campus the same week end as the Future Farmers of America representing the Smith-Hughes agricultural instruction in the state.

The typing contest this year has been changed materially to afford more competition in handling such work as is encountered in modern business. announces H. T. Vance, head of the department. Instead of being a race merely for speed and accuracy, the contest will consist of exercises in punctuation, spacing and the general setup of a business letter.

Tigard high school won the typing contest last year and Corvallis high the shorthand transcription contest.
