### FCA LOANS \$79,500,000.

SPokane, Wn. — Approximately \$79,500,000 has been loaned in the four Pacific Northwest states by the four institutions under the Farm Credit Administration of Spokane, according to recent announcement. This money was loaned out in the period May 12, 1933, to April 13, 1934. These institutions are: the Federal Land Bank, the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank, the Production Credit Corporation, and the Bank of Cooperatives.

### Money Earning Schemes.

A warning has been issued by A. H. Averill, Oregon State Insurance Commissioner, against insurance rackets in the state being carried on by the Golden Hour Company of Minneapolis. The company is not licensed to operate in Oregon and is carrying on an extensive radio broadcast program. Such a racket is an old story and people should be very sure that the company is an old established concern before they put any money, no matter how small a sum, into any insurance. Information about the soundness of any company may be secured from the state commissioner at Salem, Ore.

Insurance is a fine investment and there are many established companies which will give the policy holder a return for his investment because it has worked up a surplus after years of operation.

Another scheme which has been worked in this territory within the past few weeks is the sale of memberships in a country club which seems, upon investigation, to be a legitimate concern, but at the same time is being highly misrepresented. Local authorities who have looked into the case, warn against investing any money before an opportunity has been offered to see the club grounds which is said to be located at Bremerton, Wn.

Precaution should always be taken before any money is invested in insurance policies or memberships.
