This game is being promoted by the Golden Hour Company of Minneapolis, which has organized five benefit associations for the purpose of attaching the dollars of the uninformed. These benefit associations, which are not licensed to transact business in Oregon, are as follows: Golden Hour Benefit association; Family Benefit association; Protection Benefit association; Economic Benefit association; and Reconstruction Benefit association.

The commissioner warns the public to beware both as to purchasing memberships in these associations and in the influencing of others to become members, as the latter is a direct violation of the Oregon laws and subjects the guilty parties to fine and imprisonment.
