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O.S.C. Student Wins Big Award.

For the third time in the eight years it has been granted, the national prize for the best technical paper submitted by students from the 113 college branches of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers has been won by an O.S.C. student. Tom Wagner of Portland has just been awarded the first prize of \$100 for his paper dealing with a new method of measuring

surrent and power in communication circuits. In the regional competition Oregon State students have taken first place for the six consecutive years that awards were made in the northwest states.
