dates listed as September 3 to 8. Opening day is again Labor Day and thousands are expected to jam the gates as they did last year.

With a blue ribbon as cover design, the 1934 state premium list is an attractive little book. And more attractive are the thousands of dollars of premiums listed on the 92 pages within its covers. According to Max Gehlar, director, prizes and premiums will total about \$50,000.

This year's premium list, of which 5,000 were mailed out, contains the largest number of classifications and individual premiums ever. All premiums are practically doubled over last year and many are nearly at the 1931 level—the last year that the state appropriated money for the fair. The cattle division is especially high.

FATHER DOMINIC O'BONNOR NAMED TO MARIAN CONGRESS

against the conscription act of the British parliament. When the Irish republic began to function in the City of Cork, Lord Mayor MacCurtain reinstated the civic chaplaincy which had been in abeyance for 36 years, and appointed Father Dominic as lord mayor's chaplain.

Later Brigade Commander MacSweeney was elected lord mayor and he reappointed Father Dominic as his chaplain, and in this capacity he attended the lord mayor during his long fast in Brixton prison. In November, 1922, he went to

Bend, Ore., and later was transferred to Hermiston.

Father Dominic distinguished himself as a historian, carrying on research in Ireland, Northeastern France and Belgium for the papal commission on the beautification of the Irish martyrs of the 16th and 17th century, when he unearthed many uncatalogued manuscripts of interest and value regarding Ireland in these centuries. He recently completed the history of the Baker diocese, the first such work offered west of the Mississippi river.
