Wallace Reid, son of J. H. Reid, who has been visiting his parents here last week, left Monday for his home in Hillsboro, Ore.

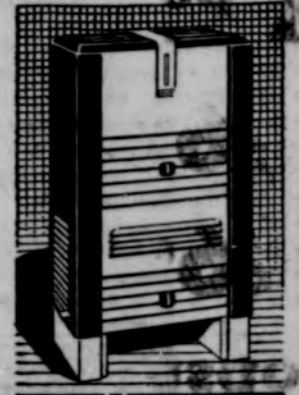
