**White Federation Grown**

Heppner—B. H. **PUBLIC UTILITIES**—I believe in strict regulation of utilities and the sales of their securities to investors.

**EDUCATION**—Oregon must maintain its splendid system of education. It is the guarantee of our future progress and stability of government.

**DAIRYING**—New markets, adequate profit margins, stable prices are important to the dairyman and I pledge my efforts along these lines.
