The report on the 12-minute interview granted Representative Walter M. Pierce with President Roosevelt Wednesday carries the clearest, most encouraging statements released from the White House in months, on the development of the Columbia river to the mouth of the Snake river.

First, the president agrees with Pierce that freight rates are too high and that the Columbia should have a nine-foot channel instead of seven feet as proposed in bills introduced by the Oregon delegation for several years past. He also inquired why money was not available for the \$400,000 channel improvement between Celilo and Umatilla, which would indicate his approval of immediate allocation of funds if they are available.

Second, the president does not favor speed in the approval of the project but would have it understood that a thorough study and survey is being made of the upper Columbia river proposed improvement. The building of the Umatilla dam is the only possible construction on the river which will link the Inland Empire territory with sea ports to allow navigation from the Snake to Portland. With the construction of Bonneville dam, the \$49,000 channel improvement between Celilo and Umatilla, and the building of the Umatilla rapids dam, the Columbia river will be navigable for 250 miles, and the building of three dams on the Snake river will provide a means of bringing millions of tons of freight down the river to Portland.

The president does not want any bills or legislation regarding development on the Columbia presented at this time, which will give ample time for definite, constructive study of the problems this coming summer. It would appear that the army engineers' reports will be complete by that time, furnishing a

definite basis upon which to work. It is a program that must be carried out step by step and without haste, preceded by surveys, reports and recommendations by army engineers.
 By 1936, another election year, the complete program should be definitely outlined, and ready to go.
