EASTERN OREGON HELPED BY DROUTH SPRINGS AND WELLS.

The cooperative project by the Drouth Relief service and the Oregon SERA to provide wells and improved springs in the drouth stricken eastern Oregon livestock country, resulted in the improvement of 2000 springs and the establishment of 200 wells, of direct benefit to 705 families in 10 eastern Oregon counties, according to a compilation just made by P. M. Brandt of Oregon State College, assistant drouth relief director for this state.

The permanent improvement of the water facilities over this vast area has been described as one of the best SERA projects yet attempted, and the efficient method by which it was carried out under the direction of Ivan Oakes, district engineer for the SERA, has attracted much attention, even outside of Oregon according to reports received by Professor Brandt. As soon as money was received from the federal government last July, ear-marked for this emergency work, crews of unemployed were put at the task without delay in counties which had been devastated in whole or in part as drouth areas.

Close cooperation was maintained by the works division of SERA under Burton Palmer, the county work committees, and the college, while the federal forest service supplied tents and equipment for the workers through arrangements made by E. N. Kavanaugh, assistant regional forester. County agents were all in the job, says Oakes.

Springs and water holes improvement was practically all done in the national forests, while the new wells were located on the public domain or in stock driveways where the water is now available to all within useable distance of each. In some instances a single well serves a radius of 25 miles or more, Professor Brandt reports.

The project served to supply 104,000 work hours for the unemployed in the district, or enough to provide 13,000 eight-hour days of labor. The cost for materials and equipment amounted to approximately \$3,000, while the increased value of these permanent improvements to the territory is estimated at more than \$320,000. More than a million and a quarter acres of range lands are affected by the improvements, serving a livestock population of more than 23,000 head of cattle and 575,000 head of sheep. Grant, Crook and Harney counties receive the largest number of improved springs, while Harney and Umatilla were the location of most of the new wells.

In Umatilla county 7 springs valued at \$1,215, served 23 people; and five wells valued at \$25,000 served 20 people.

mond Spokesman and honorable mention was won by the St. Helens Sentinel-Mist, and the Newberg Scribe. The Hal E. Hoss trophy, awarded to the best newspaper in cities of under 1000 population, was taken by the Redmond Spokesman. Second place went to the Malheur Enterprise and honorable mention to the Myrtle Point Herald and the Stayton Mail.

Large newspapers throughout the country were severely criticized for failing to express honest opinion on present day conditions. In an address by Col. Guy T. Viskniski, efficiency expert now at work on the Morning Oregonian in Portland. "Editors must express their opinions, without fear or favor of subscription lists or others, or the very freedom of the press will be imperilled," he declared.

Col. Viskniski cited the fighting spirit that characterized weekly newspapers a generation ago, and called for a similar spirit for newspapers of today. "President Roosevelt has said he invited criticism, and I believe he meant it," said Col. Viskniski. "If there is to be no criticism, then freedom will vanish in this country, as it has in other: where the press has been throttled."
