BRIGHT EMPLOYMENT FUTURE LOOMS FOR COLLEGE GRADS.

CORVALLIS—The specter of a jobless commencement at the conclusion of their college career does not confront most of the seniors of the technical schools at Oregon State college this year, a check-up on the employment situation shows.

In the leading men's technical schools of forestry, agriculture, engineering and pharmacy the deans report conditions greatly improved with actual shortages of prospective graduates for waiting positions. All through the depression there has been considerable demand for technical graduates, but conditions now are distinctly improved over a year or so ago, reports show.

"We could place three times the forestry graduates this spring," said President G. W. Peavy, who retains his position as dean of the forestry school. "Our hardest job is to keep them till they are graduated, as many are tempted by jobs available even before their finish."

Agricultural training covers such a broad field that conditions are mixed, but there is a distinct shortage of prospective graduates this year in many branches, says Dean W. A. Schoenfeld. "A big demand now is for men trained in soils, agricultural engineering, farm management, and some phases of plant and animal industries fitting them for work in the new grazing service, soil erosion work and rural electrification," explained Dean Schoenfeld. "More requests are coming for graduates in the other fields of agriculture as

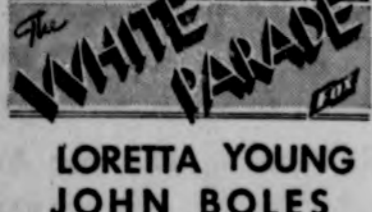
