He also promises to be 'trustworthy, loyal, helpful, friendly, courteous, kind, obedient, cheerful, thrifty, brave, clean and reverent.'

There is nothing in the program of the Boy Scout organization that does not fulfill the purpose of development of character and many qualities in young boys whose influence is being felt and will be felt in building future America. We can point to boys and young men who have come through the school of scouting in the local troop as examples of manhood. Among them are Bill Hurley, who is a student in North Dakota at present; Chester Johnson, a second year cadet at West Point; Walther Ott, outstanding 4-H club boy and graduate of O.S.C.; Bob Henderson, student at O.S.C.; Maurice Pierson, graduate of the local high school and active in 4-H club work. Since the troop was organized eight years ago by Walter Warner, teacher in the local school at that time, the Boy Scouts have had a great influence in the lives of boys in this community. The object of the organization is being felt in this country, in bringing city boys into rugged, natural environment during their holidays, to teach them self reliance and otherwise to influence them in the direction of good morals. It is a program in which everyone should have a part, and that opportunity will be given next Thursday night at the basket social and community get-together being sponsored by the American Legion as a Boy Scout benefit.

NOTICE TO SETTLERS.

Due to the fact that Cold Springs Reservoir will soon be filled to capacity, irrigation water will be available on and after March 13, 1935, to all lands eligible for water delivery.

Settlers are urged to use water at this time in order that the ground water table may be built up as early as possible and with water that might otherwise go to waste.

To be eligible for 1934 water delivery, it is necessary that the 1934 operation and maintenance assessments be paid in full. It is very important that all water assessments against lands within the district be paid as soon as possible.
