 for adjusted compensation from its inception up to the battle now being waged in congress. He told of the railroads having been given a \$20,000,000,000 bonus for use of their lines during the emergency, after the government had spent some \$4,500,000,000 on the lines while under its control; of the government's gift of millions of dollars to munition manufacturers for scrapping their machinery after they had made huge sums in war profits, and of bonuses greater than was sought by the veterans paid to federal employes on their plea that they stuck to their jobs and resisted the lure of higher salaries paid by individual concerns.

The department commander noted that the veterans did not ask for the bonus, that it was offered voluntarily by the government, and that even though it was insignificant as compared to bonuses paid in some instances, it was the only one not paid in cash.
