AT THE TOP.

Umatilla county's 2265 farms were valued at a total sum of \$59,016,144 in 1930, according to a progress report just made by L. R. Breithaupt upon the subject of farm mortgage refinancing. In this county 1325 farms were under mortgage in 1930 to the sum of \$8,535,850.

Marion county is the only other county in the state with a farm valuation comparable to that of Umatilla county. There were 4821 farms in Marion county, valued at \$50,509,930 and with 2517 mortgages totaling \$8,225,039.

The third Oregon county in the matter of farm property valuation is Clackamas, with a valuation of \$28,732,175, and the fourth county in Washington with a value of \$37,836,739.

In the second congressional district the county ranking next to Umatilla in farm wealth is Klamath with a farm valuation of \$19,222,605. Union county has farms valued at \$18,552,998; Baker county \$16,214,052; Wasco, \$14,824,452; Morrow county, \$14,228,361; Gilliam county \$11,488,249 and Grant county \$8,312,820.

The report shows that in most of the counties the percentage of farms under mortgage is approximately 50 per cent or the same percentage that prevails in Umatilla and Marion counties. The mortgage debt does not seem heavy compared with the valuation.

Umatilla county leads the state in annual farm production as well as in the value of its farms. — East Oregonian.

LOCAL ALUMNI ASKED TO BACK U. OF O. PLAN.

A number of alumni of the University of Oregon, living in and near this city, will be contacted this week by a committee of faculty members, and if sufficient interest is shown, the first "alumni summer session" will be planned and the proposal for it submitted to the state board of higher education, according to word received here from Dr. C. V. Boyer, president of the university.

If alumni show a desire for such a project, and it is approved by the state board, it will be held during the week between commencement and regular summer session, June 17 to 22, Dr. Boyer says. Alumni from all parts of the state and country will be invited to return to the campus. Faculty members, many of them veterans and favorites with students for many years, will be asked to give short courses and conduct discussion groups during the session.

Since the school will be an attempt to crowd many features of college life into the week, a program of social events that will include dances, picnics and even "millrace parties" will be planned.

The proposal for the unique venture has attracted national attention, and since Oregon announced its plans, several other institutions, among them Cornell and Minnesota, have scheduled similar events.

Dr. Victor P. Morris, professor of economics, heads the committee which will contact prominent alumni during the next few days. The committee will also ask for suggestions as to courses and affairs to be included for the session.
