He is all-inclusive, and is reflected by all that is real and eternal and by nothing else. . . . "That only is real which reflects God" (pp. 221, 479).

MRS. WIGGS, FAMILIAR FIGURE OF LITERATURE.

Although Alice Hegan Rice wrote her immortal American classic "Mrs. Wiggs of the Cabbage Patch," which in the Paramount film version, based on the play by Mrs. Rice and Anne Crawford Flexner, comes Friday to the Oasis Theatre, more than thirty years ago, the people and the circumstances which it depicts are still as universally true today as they were then or will be two hundred years hence.

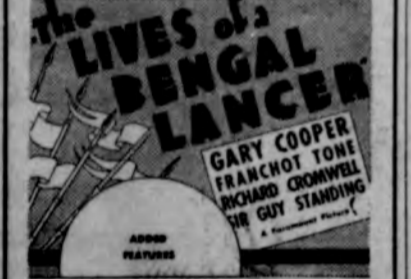
