## INLAND EMPIRE HOLDS NATION'S ATTENTION.

Spokane, Wn.—Repeatedly, business men from Spokane and the Inland Empire traveling in the east or talking to men of prominence visiting here from other sections of the country are made aware of the interest which is centered on the Pacific Northwest from business and economic stand point.

This situation, which holds so much of promise to this region, is summarized by a recent editorial in the Spokesman's Review, which reads as follows:

"W. P. Stapleton of the Northern Pacific's land settlement service told the Kennewick Chamber of Commerce last week that 500 acres of new land have been put into crops there this year. Eighty new farmers have come into the district, and 26 residents purchased additional acreage.

Dayton, official seat of Columbia county, reports that for the first time in 10 years every business site on Main street is occupied, and plans are under way for the erection of new buildings.

The Inland Empire and the Pacific Northwest are in the national eye again, after 20 years of arrested immigration and retarded development. Outstanding factors are the western drought, Grand Coulee construction and reawakened interest in irrigation. These advance agri-

vals sustain the assurance so often repeated by workers for the Columbia basin project—that the whole northwest would receive immediate benefits, once the official announcement was made that the big project had been authorized and the construction started."

## "THE RETURN OF BULLDOG DRUMMOND VASTLY EXCITING."

## Early Poisoning Recommended.

HILLSBORO—Every ground squirrel poisoned now means four less squirrels this summer, and as each adult squirrel is credited with 50 cents to \$1 worth of damage during a season, that amounts to a considerable saving, says Assistant County Agent L. E. Francis. A thousand pounds of poisoned barley has been prepared and is now ready for Washington county farmers, he says. This bait does not kill game birds, but domesticated fowls are more or less susceptible, according to Francis. Cattle, too, are susceptible to any considerable amount of the poison, and it is important to keep dead squirrels away from the dogs, as they usually contain enough strychnine to kill a dog, he says.
