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Probable, But Not Certain.

Every day we are asked, over and over, "when will we get the dam?" Everywhere everybody believes it is going to be built. But the authority for construction must come from Washington and there are a multitude of problems bothering the minds of the president and his administrative officers just now.

Col. T. M. Robbins, chief of engineers, has recommended the low dam, at 319.5 feet elevation as the only practical navigation structure at Umatilla rapids and has recommended against the proposed high dam and open river or channel development.

His report is now with the board of Army engineers in Washington. It has been examined by our senators and congressmen who will soon have a special hearing and will urge immediate construction, at a cost of \$23,240,000. The president has just set up his board of advisers for the distribution of the big relief fund of four millions, and they have had the first meeting, yesterday. They have allocated half the money to eight kinds of projects, one or two of which may include the work on the Columbia, but no direct allocations have been made. Mr. Ickes has stated that as soon as money is made available for any certain project work will begin at once.

The Army engineers approve the work, public sentiment is outspoken and strong for it, the president and his administrative family have the funds, Senator Steiwer and Congressman Pierce are daily watching and urging the necessary funds, and everybody is waiting for the final scratch of the pen.

OREGON FIRE CHIEFS WILL MEET AT CORVALLIS IN JUNE.

Salem, Ore., May 6 (Special)—Following a meeting of the program committee of the Oregon Fire Chiefs Association, President Percy E. Tallman announces the annual Firemen's School will be held in Corvallis, June 12, 13 and 14.

It is planned for the school to be opened with addresses by Governor Charles H. Martin, State Fire Marshal Huh H. Earle and a representative of the League of Oregon Cities.

The school is to be a departure from the methods of previous schools being designed to be of particular benefit to the smaller chiefs and the firemen. All in attendance will have an opportunity to take

part in the actual, practical evolutions which will be directed by some of the best authorities in the state. These evolutions will cover the different phases of the firemen's work from the time the alarm is received and the apparatus leaves the station on through the best methods of hose laying and handling, use of ladders, fire escapes, standpipes, rescue, first aid, and salvage work.

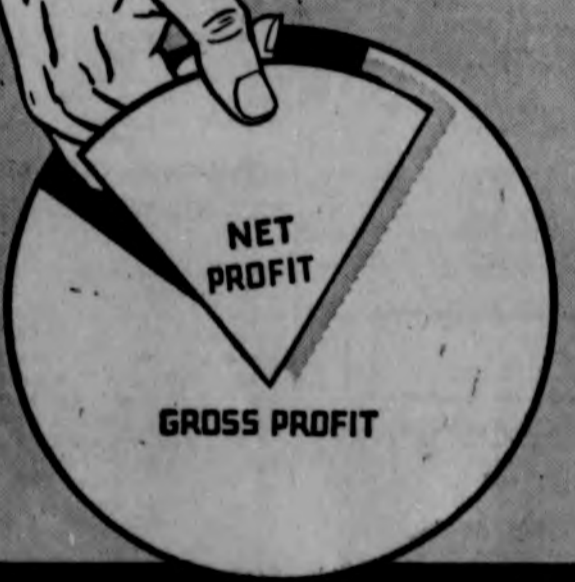
