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Umatilla Dam Now.

The Umatilla Dam must and will be built. When? That's the question. Col. T. M. Robins in his Fourth of July address leaves the impression as an engineer for a five years' wait. But, judging by the report of an interview, as a citizen, and a man well acquainted with all conditions relative to river development, he approves its early or immediate be-

ginning. Bonneville will be completed by 1937. The channel will be completed Col. Robins states, in two years. Ship locks were justified by tonnage above Umatilla. The Dalles justify ship loading facilities and expenditure of hundreds of thousands of dollars for loading ships. But the Dalles will not have a ship load at its port at one time unless barges and boats are permitted to bring tonnage over the Umatilla rapids.

Cheaper power rates at Bonneville cannot be justified without river tonnage, and river tonnage to Bonneville in such amounts is impossible without the Umatilla dam.

It is plain hokey to talk further channel work on up the Columbia and Snake. A 7x150 foot channel from Umatilla to the mouth of the Snake would cost \$5,000,000 and then the current would be too swift to navigate. Any talk about building boats to make the current is plain nonsense, and this is said on highest authority.

Bonneville has its money and approval. Same as to Grand Coulee; Roza project; three projects at Portland and up the Willamette. Everybody is getting theirs. Nobody is looking after our dam. Pendleton likes a flood control above town. Walla Walla wants a lot of things. Portland has its ear to the ground for more appropriations right at

Spokane is guarding Coulee dam and is timid about working for the Snake. Lewiston is way up stream and don't see down stream past a few dams.

No one except us, are directly, first, last and all the time watching the Umatilla dam. And we are asleep on the job most of the time. We depend on the Inland Empire Waterways association, or our senators or congressman. Hoping that "George" will do the job.

There are more people living within 40 miles of the Umatilla dam than live in any one of 30 counties in the state. This paper has a circulation bigger than any local paper in ten counties of Oregon. Let's get to work.
