RICHARD DIX STAR OF "THE ARIZONIAN" AT THE OASIS.

Movie-goers eager to see Richard Dix in such a role as Yancey Cravat in "Cimarron" are said to have their longing appeased in "The Arizonian," his latest starring production to be shown at the Oasis theatre Wednesday and Thursday.

As in the epic of Oklahoma, Dix is an unflinching supporter of law and order. Visiting graft-ridden Silver City, a mushroom town of the early West, he accepts the post of marshal and campaigns against out-lawry. He has an ordinance passed which disarms the town. He arrests a fellow officer's murderer single-handed. He antagonizes the sheriff, a crooked authority. He rebuffs the town judge, the sheriff's tool.

An action-crammed climax brings Dix to battle with the foe. The blazing ruins of the county prison form a barricade for the marshal's operatives, who are outnumbered two to one.

The blonde charmer of "The Informer," Margot Grahame, is a prominent figure in "The Arizonian," involved in a romance with the peace officer and his brother.
