(Continued from Page 1) grown successfully. He pointed out that the decline of acreage and yield of alfalfa on the Hermiston project was due to the lack of selection of the right variety. A hardy grimm is recommended when more than one cutting is desired. The seed is easily secured and it is a hardy variety. Prof. Hyslop spoke of the possible development of the broom corn industry in this section, especially in the Boardman and Irrigon districts. Careful selection of seed from local fields was urged.

Sports Program. In the late afternoon a sports program of races and contests was staged under the direction of A. E. Bense.
