NEW RURAL SOCIOLOGY HEAD NAMED AT O.S.C.

Dr. Glenn A. Bakkum, head of the department of sociology at the University of Wichita, has been named as new head of the department of rural sociology at Oregon State college, subject to final approval by the State Board of Higher Education. He succeeds Dr. E. H. Moore, who has been transferred to the University of Oregon.

Those who have worked with the

new department head say he is practical minded and knows rural life thoroughly. He is a graduate of Iowa State college, with advance degrees from Columbia and Cornell universities. He served for three years in Kansas as director of the bureau of municipal social research and was president of the Kansas Conference of Social Work.

Water Helps Sweet Corn Crop.

HILLSBORO—Irrigation of sweet corn meant the difference between a profitable crop and no crop at all on the W. T. Putnam farm this year, County Agent W. F. Cyrus reports. Because of backward season and other circumstances, the land was plowed late and most of the moisture lost. With irrigation it produced approximately four tons of sweet corn to the acre, with the better part of the field making five tons to the acre and a small corner that received no water yielding less than a ton per acre. It was also demonstrated in this field that to be of any profit, water must be applied before corn is in silk.
