TWO COUNTIES REPRESENTED IN ROAD MEET HERE.

ington. At that point it connects with the Oregon-Washington highway with a westerly direction down Willow Creek to Ione and further to Heppner Junction and Arlington, and southeasterly to Heppner. At Heppner it connects with the new Heppner-Spray highway which leads into the John Day valley and connects with the John Day highway, and the many roads leading off the John Day highway to Burns, Vale, Lakeview, Canyon City, Mitchell, Fossil, Prineville, Bend, Klamath Falls and on into California.

Living within close proximity to the highway are approximately ten thousand people who will make frequent use of the road, in addition to the general trucking service required by the many communities. The road also connects up the great sheep, cattle and horse ranges in Grant, Wheeler and Fossil and southern Umatilla counties with the feeding grounds of hay producing sections of Willow Creek, Butter Creek and the irrigated projects in these two counties.

The wheat fields of Morrow county will also be given service to the proposed port at Umatilla, which will follow the completion of the channel work now being started from Celilo to Umatilla. The road will also provide a better route from Heppner and Lexington, and Ione to Pendleton, and promise of support of the Pendleton Chamber of Commerce and business men has been given. It was shown the road was of great importance as a local, state, interstate and federal highway.

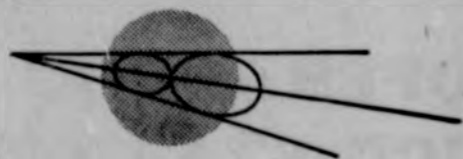
