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UMATILLA RAPIDS.

Marshall Dana made an excellent speech at the recent meeting of the Inland Empire Waterways association but he is incorrect in saying that "the open river improvement authorized will facilitate navigation to Wallula."

As the East Oregonian understands the present contract it provides for work between Celilo and Umatilla but does not quite extend even to Umatilla.

The sector between Umatilla and the mouth of the Snake cannot be handled by the so-called open river methods. It will be necessary to construct the dam at Umatilla rapids.

This has long been the contention of the Umatilla rapids proponents and it is now the official view of the war department.

The next step is the building of the dam and there is no reason why it should be delayed. Fear that the power to be generated cannot be marketed within a period of 20 years is groundless.

The power will be sold very soon after the power is generated if rates are given in keeping with the cost of power production.—East Oregonian.

We might also add that the third point in the seven-point program outlined at the time of organization of the Inland Empire Waterways association was the construction of the Umatilla navigation dam and locks, which will provide slack water from Umatilla (292 miles inland) to the mouth of the Snake and a series of five or six dams in the Snake to provide slack water navigation to the vicinity of Lewiston. With this, among other aims for developing navigation on the Columbia in view, we contend that the money contributed to support this program should not be used for letterheads carrying a full illustration of the Whitman Memorial for Walla Walla and the name of the secretary only, instead of maps showing navigation possibilities on the Columbia.

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CHURCHES

"PROBATION After Death" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, Oct. 27.

The Golden Text was, "Blessed is the man that endureth temptation; for when he is tried, he shall receive the crown of life, which the Lord hath promised to them that love him" (James 1:12).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "But when the morning was now come, Jesus stood on the shore; as soon then as they were come to land, they saw a fire of coals there, and fish laid thereon, and bread. Jesus saith unto them, Come and dine" (John 21: 4, 9, 12).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "This spiritual meeting with our Lord in the dawn of a new light is the morning meal which Christian Scientists commemorate . . . Use Lots of "Paradi" in Linn.

ALBANY—More than 2000 pounds of paridichlorobenzene was purchased by Linn county farmers this year for use in the control of peach and prune root borers. This is in comparison to 200 pounds used in 1933 and 900 pounds in 1934, says County Agent, F. C. Mullen.
