## HERMISTON GENERAL HOSPITAL HOLDS OPEN HOUSE WEDNESDAY

### 152 VISITORS VIEW NEW AND DIFFERENT ARRANGEMENT.

#### Hospital Space Adequate for Nine Beds; Pleasure Expressed at Showing.

The 152 guests who visited the Hermiston General Hospital during "open house" Wednesday expressed pleasure and pride in the hospital located at the junction of Main street and the Diagonal road, which is being opened by Mr. and Mrs. Alton Kingsbury. Hermiston has been without a hospital for several months and the prospects of having such an institution again adds a feeling of security to residents in this and adjacent communities.

Visitors were shown through the hospital by Mr. and Mrs. Kingsbury, and also by Mr. and Mrs. F. Neff who have assisted in getting the hospital in readiness for the opening. Mr. Neff is president of the Portland Sanitarium and Mrs. Neff is Mr. Kingsbury's mother.

#### Surgery Remodeled.

The surgery has been enlarged and a utility room added with outside stairway on the south side of the building. The surgery will be equipped to handle major surgery and has a three globe, non-shadow 750-watt light which will be used during all major operations. An adequate sterilizer has been loaned to the hospital by the Hermiston Hospital association which far exceeds as used previously in the local hospital. The association also furnished adjustable bed, and mattress.

Additional bed space is being utilized on the first floor in a large east room for a four bed ward and a bright sun room to the right of the entrance as another room. Rooms on the second floor have been entirely renovated by papering and painting, and new floor coverings have been laid in the halls and on the stairway. The public will have access to nine beds in the new hospital.

Mrs. Kingsbury graduated from the Portland Sanitarium with class of 1930, and served as surgical nurse for two years in the Mt. Zion Hospital in the state of Washington. Until a short time before coming to Hermiston she operated a 30-bed maternity home at Garibaldi, Oregon.

Small contributions have been made to the hospital and these are labeled in order that visitors may know who the donors were. All contributions appear elsewhere on this page.
