**REGIONAL FOREST CHANGES**

Supervisor L. B. Pagter of the Mount Baker national forest, Bellingham, Wn., has been appointed to the Portland regional forest office and Thomas H. Burgess recently assistant supervisor of the Umpqua national forest, Roseburg, Oregon, has been appointed supervisor to

take Pagter's place at Bellingham, according to announcement this week by C. J. Buck, regional forester, U. S. Forest Service.

Pagter becomes assistant to the regional engineer in the emergency work office at Portland which has charge of the regional CCC and ERA activities of the forest service. Burgess for the past few months has been acting supervisor of the Siuslaw national forest and supervisor Ralph S. Shelley will now resume charge of the Eugene office after approximately a year's absence, during which he has devoted his time exclusively to work for the Re-settlement Administration in Oregon. Under the new set-up Shelley expects to give some time to the resettlement program in addition to his duties as supervisor.

Pagter and Burgess have had wide practical experience in forestry. Graduating from Yale in 1909 and with a master's degree from the Yale Forest school in 1911, Pagter started in forest service work in 1911 as forest assistant on the Snoqualmie national forest with headquarters at Seattle. He has since served on the Okanogan, Colville and Mount Baker forests in Washington and the Whitman and Siuslaw forests in Oregon. From 1917 to 1919 Pagter had nearly two years of military service. In 1920 he became supervisor of the Colville national forest and since 1927 has been supervisor of the Mount Baker forest.

**FORESTER REPORTS FAVORABLY ON ELK SEASON.**

The annual ten day elk hunt for the five northeastern counties of Oregon closed last week with a total of some 650 bull elk bagged by 2753 hunters, according to E. P. Cliff, assistant in range management of the U. S. Forest Service, who has just returned from the hunting territory.

The hunt centered principally in the Blue Mountain area on the Walla Walla river drainage, Desolation Creek, the headwaters of the Grande Ronde, the north fork of the John Day and the Ukiah ranger district, where the elk herds have increased to largest proportions. Another hunting district was the country north of the Wallowa mountains.

The open season was effectively handled by the state police, the state game commission, and the forest service, working in close cooperation.

Cliff reported. Thirteen checking stations inspected the equipment of each hunter, making sure that there were of sufficient caliber and that each party was properly equipped to save its kill.
