AMENDED ARTICLES OF ASSOCIATION OF THE GRANGE CO-OPERATIVE OF STANFIELD.

Article I
The name of this Association shall be The Grange Cooperative of Stanfield.

Article II
The purpose of this Association and the enterprise, business and pursuit in which it proposes to engage is:

(1) To promote and provide a medium for unity of effort in buying and distributing such commodities as are essential to agriculture and to encourage and develop cooperation among both producer and consumer.

(2) To engage in any activity in connection with the buying, selling, transporting, handling or storing of any and all commodities that may be bought, handled or stored to the advantage of this association or its members.

(3) To act in its own name as principal or agent; to contract with producers, manufacturers, brokers, wholesalers or others; to establish its own agencies or branches anywhere at any time; to act as a joint agency or as a representative of other cooperatives or corporations of any kind, or to become a stockholder or member of other cooperative associations or corporations; to establish and maintain joint agencies, cooperative or otherwise; to join other organizations or to otherwise cooperate with other groups.

(4) To borrow or to lend money, either as principal or agent, giving or taking such evidence of indebtedness as may be necessary or desirable, for the purchase of property or commodities or any other purpose within the scope of these Articles of Association.

(5) To buy, acquire, hold, own, lease, sell and otherwise dispose of and exercise all privileges of ownership over such real or personal property of any character, either within or without the state as may be deemed necessary or desirable for the conduct of its business or incidental thereto.

(6) To guarantee, purchase, or otherwise acquire, hold, sell, assign, transfer, mortgage, pledge or otherwise dispose of shares of stock, bonds, or other evidences of indebtedness, and while the holder of such securities to exercise all the rights and privileges of ownership including the right to vote thereon.

(7) To issue stocks, bonds, deeds of trust, debentures, notes or other obligations, and to secure same by pledge, mortgage, trust deed or otherwise, and also to issue such obligations without security.

(8) To purchase, hold and reissue the shares of its stock as provided by law and the by-laws of this Association.

(9) To issue its stock and to accept therefor in payment, in whole or in part, certificates of equity, or the contribution of members to the two per cent revolving fund, acquired under the old Articles of Association, or patronage refunds, acquired or to be acquired under these revised Articles of Association and By-laws.

(10) This Association may make purchases of merchandise for non-members in an amount, the value of which does not exceed the value of the merchandise purchased for members, subject always however to the laws of the State of Oregon and of the United States.

(11) To apply for, take out, acquire, own, use and dispose of trademarks, copyrights and patents, necessary, convenient or desirable for furthering any of the corporate purposes of this Association.

(12) The foregoing enumeration of specific powers shall not be held to limit or restrict in any manner the powers of this Association, but said Association shall have all the privileges and immunities granted by acts of Congress of the United States and the laws of the State of Oregon to cooperative Associations and be subject only to such restrictions and limitations as may be contained in said acts of congress and the laws of said state. It is further expressly provided that this association shall have full and complete power to engage in and to transact any lawful business whatsoever, and to do any and all things necessary therefor to the same extent that any

private person or corporation might do, as principal or agent, trustee or otherwise, alone or in company with others, except as such powers may be limited or denied by said acts of congress or the laws of said State of Oregon heretofore mentioned.

ARTICLE III.
The principal office and place of business of this association shall be in the City of Hermiston, County of Umatilla, State of Oregon, but offices or places of business may be located at any other point in the United States.

ARTICLE IV.
The duration of this association shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE V.
The amount of the capital stock of this association shall be twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00), divided into one thousand shares of the par value of \$25.00 each. This entire amount shall be common stock.

ARTICLE VI.
The conditions under which the capital stock of this association may be transferred, and the restrictions or privileges attaching to ownership thereof are as follows:

(1) Stock shall be sold to and held only by those already members of this association or those eligible for membership as determined by the by-laws of this association and who are approved as members by the manager, subject, however, to appeal or review by the Board of Directors. On such questions of eligibility, a majority vote shall rule. Stock shall be transferred only to the association, or to a party who has been approved as a member as hereinbefore provided. Any attempt to transfer stock except as hereinbefore and hereinafter provided in these articles of association and by-laws shall vest no title in the receiver or purchaser and no rights of the original holder to participate in the affairs or savings of the association. No voting privilege shall be accorded stock as such. Dividends on stock may be paid but not to exceed eight per cent per annum.

(2) The association shall have the right to redeem outstanding shares of stock when it shall appear that the holder or holders of such stock are no longer active members of the association or when it appears that the owner of such stock has more than one share and the volume of his purchases from the association does not justify such ownership from a cooperative standpoint.

(3) Transfers of stock shall be made on the books of the association only at the personal request of the owner or his accredited representative, except that there shall be a limitation on the parties to whom stock may be transferred as previously set forth in these articles. Transfers shall be made on the books of the association only upon the surrender of the stock properly endorsed. Transfer books may be closed ten days prior to dividend dates or the annual meeting.

(4) Each certificate of stock shall have printed thereon a clear and concise statement of all restrictions and limitations upon ownership, voting power, transfer, dividends or other conditions affecting ownership, or the rights and privileges of same.

(5) The treasury stock of this association shall consist of stock owned or acquired by the association by purchase or otherwise and it shall be held subject to action by the Board of Directors. Such stock shall not share in dividends but it may be resold or cancelled at the discretion of the Board of Directors subject to the laws of the State of Oregon.

ARTICLE VII.
This association is formed to function on a cooperative basis for the mutual benefit of its members. Reasonable reserves, as determined by the Board of Directors of the association, may be set aside from year to year. After setting aside such reserves and making such deductions as may be necessary to retire loans and after the payment of the limited dividends hereinbefore set forth, the balance of the net earnings or savings shall be distributed on a patronage basis.

PENDLETON PRODUCTIVE CREDIT ASSOCIATION ANNUAL MEET

Stockholding members of the Pendleton Production Credit association will hold their second annual business meeting Thursday, January 16, at Pendleton, Ore. It is announced by secretary-treasurer, W. E. Moore. The meeting will convene at 1:00 o'clock in the Chamber of Commerce rooms, Elk's building.

"Our directors urge every member to be present," Mr. Moore declares, "because the success of any cooperative enterprise depends a lot on how well informed its membership is, and the interest they take in its affairs."

Members will be well repaid for attending, and as stockholders it is their privilege and duty to take full part in the proceedings. Complete reports on our operations during the past year will be given by President James Hill and by Mr. Moore, as secretary. A representative of the Production Credit Corporation of Spokane, which holds an investment in our class A non-voting stock and is helping us, will be present also to answer questions and clear up points of confusion.

The Pendleton Production Credit association is strictly a farmers' business organization enabling its members to finance their seasonal operations cooperatively at low actual cost. Ownership of voting capital stock on the basis of one \$5 share for each \$100 borrowed gives members full participation in the affairs of the association and direct responsibility for electing directors who will insure good management and avoid losses.

The association borrows its loan funds from the Federal Intermediate Credit bank at Spokane for two per cent at present and charges its members 5 per cent. But whatever saving that can be made out of the 3 per cent operating margin will be returned to members in the form of dividends after adequate reserves have been set up. The Intermediate Credit bank obtains the funds it lends to the association by marketing debentures to the investing public, backed by the notes and security which farmers put up. Thus a dependable supply of funds is available at all times on terms especially fitted to agriculture's needs.
