BY-LAWS

Grange Co-operative of Stanfield

(Continued from last week)

ARTICLE VIII—DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

Section 1. The president shall preside over all meetings of the association and the Board of Directors; sign as president all papers which he is authorized to sign by the Board of Directors; call special meetings of the Association and the Board of Directors, and perform all acts usually required of an executive and presiding officer.

Section 2. In the absence or disability of the president, the vice-president shall preside and perform the duties of the president.

Section 3. The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep a complete record of all meetings of the Association and of the Board of Directors; keep a membership roll; keep the stock book; sign on behalf of the Association all papers which he is authorized to sign by the Board of Directors; serve all notices required by law and these by-laws; receive and disburse all funds and be the custodian of all property of the Association; keep a complete record of all business of the Association and make a full report of all matters and business pertaining to his office to the members at their annual meeting and make all reports required by law; and perform such other duties as may be required of him by the Association or the Board of Directors.

Section 4. If the office of secretary and treasurer are held by different persons the Board of Directors shall by resolution inscribed in the minute books prescribe the duties of each.

Section 5. In case of the absence or disability of any officer of the Association, or for any other reason deemed sufficient by a majority of the Board of Directors, the Board may delegate the powers or duties of such officer to any other officer or to any Director for the time being.

ARTICLE IX—CAPITAL STOCK

Section 1. The capital stock of this Association is Twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00), divided into one thousand shares of the par value of Twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) each.

Section 2. Stock shall be sold to and be held only by those eligible and accepted as members as provided in Section I, Article 3, of these By-laws. Dividends may be paid on stock but not to exceed eight per cent per annum. No voting privilege shall be accorded stock as such, but every member must agree to purchase one such share of stock. Such agreement creates no financial obligation on the part of the member other than the agreement that his equities in the Association, his contribution to the two per cent revolving fund and fifty per cent of his potential patronage refunds may be applied on the purchase price of said stock.

Section 3. Stock may be issued or assigned to members but may not be delivered until the full purchase price thereof has been paid. The transfer of such equities in stock only partially paid for and the purchase of such equities by the Association shall be made in the same manner and recorded in the books of the Association as though fully paid for. Dividends may not be paid on stock until it has been fully paid for.

Section 4. Certificates of stock shall be signed by the president or vice-president and by the secretary-treasurer or his assistant. If a certificate of stock is lost or destroyed another may be issued in its place upon proof of such loss or destruction and upon the giving of a bond of indemnity not exceeding in amount double the value of the stock.

Section 5. Each certificate of stock shall have printed thereon a clear and concise statement of all restrictions upon ownership, voting power, transfer, dividends or other conditions affecting the rights and privileges of the holder thereof.

Section 6. Whenever the holder of stock desires to sell said stock it shall first be offered to the Association. In the event, however, that said stock is not purchased by the Association, or by an eligible party designated by the Board of Directors, within thirty days after the receipt of a written notice to the Association offering such stock for sale, then the holder may sell such stock to any person who has been approved as a member by the management of the Association. The sale of a person's entire stock automatically cancels his membership in the Association. Any attempt to transfer stock except as described herein shall vest no title in the holder or purchaser and no rights of the original holder to participate in the affairs of the Association.

Section 10. The treasury stock of the Association shall consist of stock that may be purchased or otherwise acquired by the Association and it shall be held subject to action by the Board of Directors. Such stock shall not share in dividends but may be resold or cancelled at the discre-

tion of the Board of Directors, subject to the laws of the State of Oregon.

ARTICLE X—OPERATING METHODS

Section 1. The primary function of this Association shall be to serve as a bargaining organization for its members, but it may establish warehouses, provide transportation facilities or any other facilities or services for directly or indirectly handling its products, and shall fix all terms and conditions of sale all as determined by the Board of Directors.

Section 2. The Association shall be operated for the mutual benefit of its members. After the expenses of the year are paid, including deductions for reserves, the Association may pay dividends on its stock but not to exceed eight per cent. Such sums as may remain for distribution to the members shall be apportioned as patronage refunds in accordance with the amounts of products purchased by each member from or through the Association.

Section 3. The amount of deductions in any one year for operating capital, contingencies, capital investments, retirement of indebtedness or any other proper Association purpose shall be determined by the Board of Directors.

Section 4. The amount deducted in any one year for the purpose of maintaining reserves shall be shown on the books of the Association and in the event of distribution or dissolution of the Association payment shall be made to each member in proportion to the deductions made from the business which each has contributed. No member withdrawing from the Association under any condition shall be entitled to receive a refund from this reserve account unless and until all members receive a proportional distribution.

Section 5. If the office expense of handling records for deductions for reserves and patronage refunds on small purchases is greater than the amount of such reserves and dividends, then the Board of Directors may fix the minimum amount of any single transaction at any one time which shall be recorded for the purpose of participation in refunds or patronage refunds.

ARTICLE XI—NON-MEMBER BUSINESS

Section 1. The Association may, at the discretion of the Board of Directors, sell its products to non-members, provided that its business with non-members shall not exceed in value that of its business with members.

Section 2. Non-members shall be paid patronage refunds the same as members, however, not to exceed fifty per cent of such refunds shall be paid in cash. The balance may be retained by the Association and credited on the books of the Association until such time as the said non-member purchases or agrees to purchase one share of stock and become a member of this Association. Only in the event that said non-member is ineligible or is refused membership in the Association may he sell his equities in such retained refunds and then only to a member of the Association who will be permitted to have such refunds credited on his capital stock purchases.

ARTICLE XII—AFFILIATIONS

Section 1. The Board of Directors shall have the power to join with other generally similar organizations in maintaining purchasing or selling agencies, or in otherwise providing or conducting activities in conjunction with such other organizations when in their opinion it is desirable to do so.

ARTICLE XIII—NOTICES

Section 1. Notice of membership meetings shall be given as provided in Section 3 of Article 4 of these by-laws. Notices of Director's meetings shall be given by mail, by telephone or word of mouth and shall be given three days in advance of such meeting. The presence of any officer or any member of the Board at any meeting shall be deemed a waiver of the regularity of the notice of any such meeting, insofar as such officer or member of the Board is concerned.

ARTICLE XIV—ACCOUNTS AND AUDITING.

This Association shall install a system of accounts and provide other accounting appurtenances that may be necessary to conduct the business in a safe and orderly manner.

Section 2. A complete audit shall be made at any time upon order of the Board of Directors or upon a majority vote of the members at any regular or called meeting.

ARTICLE XV—AMENDMENTS These By-laws may be amended at any meeting of the membership by a two thirds vote of the members present at any meeting of the members provided that a notice of the proposed amendment is included in the call for said meeting.

Notice of Eligibility of Members of Farm Bureau Co-operative of Hermiston.

Only members of the Farm Bureau Co-operative of Hermiston, who are in good standing in their respective Farm Bureau, Farmer's Union, or Grange are eligible to vote at the annual meeting to be held in February, 1936.

In the absence of the member, the wife or husband may vote.

COLD STORAGE LOCKERS ARE NOW AVAILABLE

There is now a limited number of lockers available in both large and small sizes at the cold storage lockers in the Umatilla Co-operative Creamery.

W. B. Foster is now in charge of the meat cutting department and will become a permanent employe in that position. He has been highly recommended and has served the public for several years as a butcher.

The butcher's hours will begin at 8:00 o'clock and end when each day's cutting is done. The hours will vary according to the amount of meat handled. Persons wanting to have meat cut should arrange to bring it in during the morning hours, and will thus be able to make the necessary arrangements for the work to be done.

Cutting charges will not be changed but will be handled under a new system. The butcher will turn in to the office all cash collections and charges against creamery member's accounts. Locker non-member renters will be required to pay for butcher service at the time the meat is weighed in. That part of the meat which is to be trimmed out and ground into hamburger or sausage will be charged for on the basis of an estimated weight, and when necessary, a refund will be made when the cutting is completed. In the case of creamery members who wish to charge the amount of the butcher service, the bill will be made after cutting is completed.

The charges for butcher service are as follows: 3-4 cent per pound for cutting, wrapping and storing in locker; 1 cent per pound additional for the meat trimmed and ground into sausage or hamburger. The same applies to coarse grinding of lard.

The balance, 1-4 cent on the cutting and 1-2 cent on grinding, will pay for paper, twine, power and repairs for the grinder. This has been figured to a cost basis as nearly as possible and leaves practically no allowance for bad accounts. At the best the butcher can do, he cannot earn more than fair labor wages on an average.

This new system will not cost anybody a cent more and with the full cooperation of those concerned, the locker service will be greatly improved and will save much time and inconvenience.

The annual meeting of the members of the Umatilla Co-operative Creamery will be held at Hermiston, Ore., on Wednesday, the 5th day of February, 1936, at 10:00 o'clock A. M., for the election of four directors to hold office for the ensuing term of two years, and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before said meeting, and particularly, to vote upon an amendment to Article V of the Articles of Association of said Umatilla Co-operative Creamery, increasing the common stock from 1,000 shares to 1,500 shares.

An official ballot has been mailed to each member, together with a small voting envelope for your convenience. In case you cannot be personally present, you may prepare your ballot, properly marking the same indicating your vote, and place it in the small envelope, sealing it, and writing to the secretary requesting that it be dropped in the ballot box with the ballots cast by members present at said meeting; and on receipt of your letter, the envelope will be placed in the ballot box, and counted with the votes cast by persons present at said meeting.
