Complaints were made that the health of school children was affected by riding in heavy busses, over this road. That automobiles and trucks were damaged and operated at heavier costs, and that the conveniences to the public was greatly hindered.

The brief states that this road comprises a link in connection with roads from Heppner on south of a north and south highway connecting the state system of highways of Washington with southern Oregon counties and California.

It further states that it is of local accommodation to 10,000 people living near the roads affected, and gives service to wheat farmers, livestock growers and diversified farmers in marketing their products and in cooperative facilities for buying
