ROHRMAN MOTOR COMPANY HAS NEW TEST EQUIPMENT

A veritable "clinic" on wheels, with R. C. McReynolds, shop foreman in charge, is now at the service of all car owners in the Hermiston territory. When the Ford Laboratory Test Set is used on an automobile it enables the mechanic to diagnose and prescribe for mechanical or electrical defects, quickly and accurately. According to Mr. McReynolds, the old trial and error method is out. The steps of the test are so arranged that none has to be duplicated. When a fault is found it is corrected before going on with the next step. Plug and pumper wires are used to establish any desired circuit, and hose and special nipples are provided for testing fuel pump, carburetor and engine compression. The radio of any car may be thoroughly tested by special circuits and instruments.
