Last week the Herald carried a story and maps of the present status of the proposed Umatilla dam on the Columbia. Also a little inside information on the movements of supporters of the channel improvement above Umatilla now being advocated. We might ask, "Who is responsible?"

The man responsible for compiling this information and preparing it for presentation to the public is E. P. Dodd of Hermiston, not infallible, but a man true to the cause and cause in the belief that the Umatilla Rapids dam is the "key" to navigation on the Columbia and Snake rivers. The map illustrations of the Umatilla dam territory and of the dam proper which appeared in the Morning Oregonian three weeks ago carrying a story of the proposed dam was arranged for by Mr. Dodd through personal contact and acquaintance with members of the Oregonian staff. Once this information appeared in the large daily, other daily papers copied it, and the story of the Umatilla Rapids dam continued to be brought before the people of the Inland Empire.

The justification of the Umatilla Rapids dam has been kept before senators and representatives at Washington through continued correspondence by Mr. Dodd, and his letters have received attention where a hundred other men would not have received a reply. Mr. Dodd is identified with the dam on the Columbia between Wallula and Umatilla and it is recognized that he knows more about the political and economical workings of such a program than any other man in a similar position. Forces opposed to the

construction of the dam speak frankly to him of their program and those favoring the program are equally his confidant.

Public service has few rewards, and a worthy cause, believed in and fought for, seldom fails to be attained at some time.

This editorial is not written especially to strew flowers, although it has been said that flowers are more fragrant to men alive than to men who are dead.

The Columbia recreation park is now in fine shape due to the cooperation shown by residents of Columbia district who turned out last week to assist in the annual clean-up program despite the cold, windy day. Tree pruning and general clearing was taken care of and the ladies served a pot luck dinner at noon. Such cooperation makes for a better community.

Each individual family in the west end of Umatilla county will derive at least one dollar's good from the Hermiston Community park when it's completed, and at the present time the park board is finding it difficult to maintain the materials which are necessary to carry on the work at the park.

When asked for your part in the park by the committee which will soon call on you, give what you know is justly your part in the Hermiston community park, which will be a recreation park for many families in Umatilla county.

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CHURCHES
"UNREALITY" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, April 5.

The Golden Text was, "Charge them that are rich in this world, that they be not high-minded, nor trust in uncertain riches, but in the living God, who giveth us richly all things to enjoy" (1 Tim 6:17).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "And God saw every thing that he had made, and, behold, it was very good" (Gen. 1:31).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "Everything good or worthy, God made. Whatsoever is valueless or baneful, He did not make,—hence its unreality. In the Science of Genesis we read that He saw everything which He had made, 'and, behold, it was very good.' The corporeal senses declare otherwise; and if we give the same heed to the history of error as to the records of truth, the Scriptural record of sin and death favors the false conclusion of the material senses" (p. 525).

Drills Well for Irrigation.

ALBANY—The first deep well to be dug in Linn county for irrigation purposes will be that on the farm of E. R. Garner of Route 3, Albany. Mr. Garner is drilling a 12-inch casing well from which he hopes to obtain at about 60 foot depth water enough to irrigate a large acreage of ladino clover and other crops, according to F. C. Mullen, county agent.
