CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CHURCHES

"EVERLASTING PUNISHMENT" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, May 3.

The Golden Text was, "There is no peace, saith the Lord, unto the wicked" (Isaiah 48:22).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "Be not deceived; God is not mocked; for whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap. For he that soweth to his flesh shall of the flesh reap corruption; but he that soweth to the Spirit shall of the Spirit reap life everlasting" (Gal. 6:7,8).

The Lesson-Sermon also included correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "Man's enslavement to the most relentless masters—passion, selfishness, envy, hatred, and revenge—is conquered only by a mighty struggle. Every hour of delay makes the struggle more severe. If man is not victorious over the passions, they crush out happiness, health, and manhood. Here Christian Science is the sovereign panacea, giving strength to the weakness of mortal mind,—strength from the immortal and omnipotent Mind, and lifting humanity above itself into purer desires, even into spiritual power and good-will to man" (p. 407).
