CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CHURCHES

"**A DAM AND FALLEN MAN**" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, May 10.

The Golden Text was, "Cease ye from man, whose breath is in his nostrils; for wherein is he to be accounted off?" (Isa. 2:22).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "And God said, Let us make man in our image, after our likeness....So God created man in his own image, in the image of God created he him; male and female created he them. And God saw every thing that he had made, and behold, it was very good" (Gen. 1: 26, 27, 31).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures", by Mary Baker Eddy: "The creations of matter arise from a mist or false claim, or from mystification, and not from the firmament, or understanding, which God erects between the true and false. In error everything comes from beneath, not from above.... Throughout the first chapter of Genesis and in three verses of the second,—in what we understand to be the spiritually scientific account of creation,—it is Elohim (God) who creates. From the fourth verse of chapter two to chapter five, the creator is called Jehovah, or the Lord" (pg. 523.)
