FILM ON PROCESSING AND WEAVING WOOL AVAILABLE
A new sound slide film presenting a study of modern methods of processing and weaving wool, is now available to local clubs, educational societies and other groups through A. F. Rohrman, local Ford dealer.

It begins with views depicting the early history of sheep and goats and continues with pictures of wool processing methods.
