A. W. Behrman spent the week end in Kennewick, Wn.

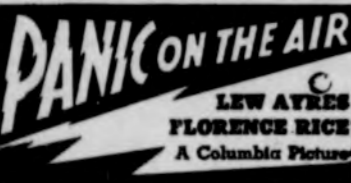
