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Daly Fund Helps Many Students.

LAKEVIEW—Since the Bernard Daly educational fund was established here 14 years ago, scholarships have been awarded to 252 different graduates of Lake county high schools. Of these 130 have attended O.S.C., 96 U. of O., and 26 the state normal schools. Of the total 86 have been graduated, divided 44, 31 and 11 respectively. This year 16 more scholarships were granted, eight to attend O. S. C., seven U. of O., and one S. O. N.

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CHURCHES "LIFE" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, July 19.

The Golden Text was, "And this is life eternal, that they might know thee the only true God, and Jesus Christ, whom thou hast sent" (John 17: 3).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "And this is the record, that God hath given to us eternal life, and this life is in his Son" (1 John 5: 11).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures", by Mary Baker Eddy: "This is life eternal," says Jesus,—is, not shall be; and then he defines everlasting life as a present knowledge of his Father and of himself,—the knowledge of Love, Truth, and Life. "This is life eternal, that they might know Thee, the only true God, and Jesus Christ, whom Thou hast sent." (p. 410).

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
