best a man can give." He continued by saying that a cooperative organization was not entitled to exist unless it can give its members a more efficient service than a private business. He told of the steps and conditions which led to the organization of the northwest association in 1930, through which 35,000,000 pounds of turkeys were shipped last year.
 The purpose of the association, Mr. Griffin said, is to get the growers the highest possible market price, with the lowest possible overhead operating cost in reaching the market. The association belongs to the growers organization and there is no individual stock owned. Representatives in the terminal markets cannot decide the price but they can have a big influence.

The blue tag marked "Norbest" identifies the northwest turkeys on any market and is becoming known for its high quality birds. The association owns all birds shipped by them until they reach the terminal market.
 A duplication of the distribution system used by automobile manufacturers is used by the northwest association.
 Entertainment during the afternoon was furnished by the "Norbest" trio composed of the Misses Esther and Helen Fredrickson of Stanfield, and Edna Ott of Hermiston. Donald DeMoss also sang several numbers, some of which were songs to the turkey growers. Miss Ott accompanied him on the violin.
