Morrow County Grange.

Plans will also be made for a program to be carried out during the coming months.

Turkey Co-op. Moves Huge Tonnage.

Eastern Oregon Turkey Growers—

Report from Mrs. Roy Penney. On September of 1930, a small band of farmers, classing themselves as Turkey Growers, applied for license to incorporate an organization known as the Eastern Oregon Turkey Growers, Inc., to be affiliated with the Northwestern Turkey Growers of Salt Lake City.

In October of that same year, John Jendzejewski was elected president, Leon Cooney vice president, E. M. Hauser secretary-treasurer, C. M. McCall, M. Potter and Theo Beletski, board of directors. Mrs. Julia H. Penney was asked to act as clerk for shipments and Lyle Tilden was secured as receiving station supervisor.

In the season of 1930-31 the organization shipped 122,124 pounds of turkeys, which brought \$21,859.57 or an average of 17c per pound, with an average of 51 per cent prime. Two cents per pound was allowed for handling charges which included all supplies and labor connected with marketing the birds. Of this two cents per pound the organization was able to refund the growers a small portion.

In the season of 1931, an annual Turkey Growers Picnic was started, which has grown to be one of Hermiston's main summer events.

For a comparison of growth, five years after the above report, the organization shipped for the year 1935-36, 419,753 pounds of turkeys which brought \$94,836.81, or an average of 22.5 cents per pound with an average of 90 per cent plus prime birds. The operating cost was less than eight tenths cent per pound.

The organization has a warehouse well equipped, and has a crew of forty people during the marketing season. The same president, warehouse manager and clerk are heading the present organization.

Co-op. Creamery Serves 340 Members.

The Umatilla Co-operative Creamery was organized on July 1st, 1931. The members of the board of directors were T. G. Gregory, J. S. Rogers, A. C. Heyden, E. L. Jackson, R. V. Jones, L. C. Cooney and A. E. McFarland.

The output for the succeeding half year was 156,225 pounds of butterfat. For 1935 the plant manufactured a total of 528,000 pounds. It now has 340 patrons.

The present board is E. L. Jackson, president, M. G. Hedwall, secretary-treasurer; Adolph Heyden, Curtis Dyer, L. Packard, R. V. Jones and A. E. McFarland.

The creamery was first installed by Kittery & Kinney, followed by Swarhouse and Townsend, who copyrighted the name "Oregon" Rose," for their butter.

These owners were followed by A. M. Sundstruff, Cecil Warner and E. W. West, who sold to the present organization.

Records show that no private creamery here ever exceeded 16,000 pounds butterfat annual production. It now is 500,000 pounds.

A cooperative cold storage plant is also operated in connection with the creamery, with 400 lockers.

W. B. Beasley and family, of wife and seven children, came here in 1905. He came to Umatilla county in 1865, 71 years ago.

Federal Credit Union Was Organized in 1935.

The Hermiston Federal Credit Union was organized in July, 1935. The president is M. G. Hedwall, the secretary-treasurer, E. H. Dunning, and other directors Roy Penney, H. J. Ott and Wm. Kik.

The Union conducts a savings and loan business, with loans only to members and is under the jurisdiction of the Federal Farm Credit Administration. Capital is supplied by members at the rate of \$5 per share. Each member is limited to \$1000, which is subject to change by the board of directors.

A credit committee consists of Al Kennings, R. G. Penney and M. G. Hedwall, whose duty it is to approve all loans. A supervisory committee consists of H. W. Loudermilk, Mrs. Georgia Henderson and A. E. McFarland, whose duties are to audit all books quarterly and have general supervision of all affairs of the union.

The first quarterly report showed an increase of 1000 per cent.

The Union is a cooperative institution, designed to help the small borrower. Up to date all funds are loaned except the five percent required by law to be kept on hand. No loan can exceed ten percent of the paid in, and unimpaired capital.

The loaning methods employed are practically the same as that of small banks. In the United States, there are now over 5000 similar credit unions, mostly under state charters. When the Hermiston Union was organized there were 450 Federal Unions, which have increased to 1600.

A. B. Stephens arrived in Umatilla in 1896. He married Kate O'Connell. He has served 12 years as school director; twelve years as councilman and 38 years as republican precinct committeeman. Their four children have graduated from the Umatilla high school. He once operated the old Umatilla House.

Co-op. Laundry Year Older Than Cannery.

The Hermiston Co-operative Laundry was started in 1928 with one Maytag in the back part of the creamery then operated by Cecil Warner. It has grown into its present quarters with six Maytags and one Dexter machine. It serves 160 patrons every week.

It is managed by Mr. and Mrs. O. L. Barlow. A charge of 35 cents for two hours is made which includes use of machines and all the hot water needed.

The board of directors are Mrs. J. H. Reid, chairman, Mrs. H. M. Sommer, secretary, Mrs. Wm. Mikesell, treasurer, Mrs. A. E. Marble, Mrs. A. E. Bense and Mrs. A. W. Turnbull.

FOUNDATION FOR STANFIELD CO-OP. YEARS BEFORE ITS ORGANIZATION

The Grange Co-operative of Stanfield, usually known as the Grange Co-op, had its foundation laid several years before the date of incorporation in the towns of Stanfield and Hermiston.

The Stanfield Grange received its first car load of coal September 1st, 1923. Among those responsible for making the venture a success were L. L. Penney, master, and F. B. Stuart, treasurer. Mr. Stuart's records show that J. M. Malloy, a granger from Irrigon, received a commission of \$9 for securing the coal from the mine. In those days it was next to impossible for organized consumers to get around their local dealer.

In the fall of 1926 at Hermiston, members of the Farm Bureau received their first shipment of a car of lumber. Among those responsible for making this venture a success were P. P. Sullivan, Leroy Sullivan and C. A. Flannigan.

Through the Grange at Stanfield and the Farm Bureau of Hermiston, each year showing increased interest and a growing volume of busi-

It was not until 1929 that there came a universal demand for the activities to be incorporated into a business institution. In February of that year certain men of the farm organizations of the two communities met at the home of Sylvanus Smith at Stanfield to plan for the organization of a new cooperative to be known as the Grange Co-operative of Stanfield, born May, 1929.

Those assisting with the work of organizing were S. H. Barnard, then manager of the Farm Bureau Co-operative, H. J. Ott, president of the Umatilla Project Farm Bureau, and H. M. Sommerer, present manager of the Farm Bureau Co-operative. The Stanfield delegat consisted of Sylvanus Smith, host, Sydney Archer, Claude McCall, J. M. Richards, who served continuously as chairman of the board of directors, S. R. Cooper, master at that time of the Stanfield Grange, and R. G. Penney, who has been manager of the cooperative since its beginning.

The success of the Grange Co-op. has increased steadily. It produced in round numbers the first year \$6000 as against \$37,000 for the year ending December 31, 1936. Although fuel and lumber were the only items handled at first, the cooperative is now carrying hardware and practically every farm need except food and clothing. Such items as boots, rubbers and sox are being handled in a very limited way.

The success of the Grange Co-operative is due wholly to a loyal and actively supporting membership of nearly 1000.

Geo. Butterwood came to Umatilla in 1907 when the Umatilla railroad pay roll was \$2700 per month. He has been with the company since his arrival.
