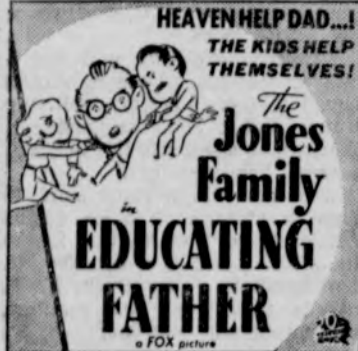
Don Serell left Wednesday night for Eugene to enroll as a sophomore at the University of Oregon.

West Extension District.

The West Extension now has 190 farms. The main canal is 28 miles in length. The diversion dam, main canal and all distributing ditches and headgates are 98 percent in concrete. It is one of the most enduring and substantial irrigating systems in the west. The cost when built by the United States exceeded \$1,000,000.

A. C. Houghton is district manager, in office 11 years. The present board of directors are A. E. McFarland, president, R. V. Jones and Leslie Packard.

The district has 28 miles of concrete laterals, nine miles of concrete pipe lines and two miles of wood pipe.

The first board was Emmet Callahan, J. G. Camp and A. E. McFarland. Other members have been C. E. Glasgow, F. C. Frederickson and J. S. White.

Jersey Breeders Organize.

The Hermiston Jersey Breeders' association was organized in 1914, succeeding a very successful exhibition of dairy stock at the second Dairy & Hog show. Memberships based on the number of cows owned, were issued at \$10 per share. With this fund three high grade young bulls were bought from the Ed Carey herd of St. Mawes strain. These were distributed in blocks about the project and rotated every two years.

During the life of the association it has bought 20 of the best sires obtainable. This course has produced many of the very high grade dairy cows here and has raised the standard of all breeds in this locality.

Cost Hermiston Project.

The irrigation system of the Hermiston district cost up to date, the sum of \$2,015,314. The West Extension cost \$1,194,968.

The Hermiston project has 120 miles of canals and pipelines. These are 75 per cent concrete, and all in

good condition. At present, through labor by the CCC boys at Stanfield, the entire length of the feed canal is being revamped. The Maxwell ditch is being enlarged. Some drainage is being added and improved. forty miles of patrol road are enlarged.

With present methods of maintenance the system can be maintained indefinitely. The crew of CCC workers vary from a single group of 150 and are expected to be available for two or three years.
