Since there was no team last year, there is little to base judgment upon as to the calibre of the team that will represent the school, but with a large and enthusiastic squad, Hermiston high school will bank on Coach O'Neil to turn out a scrappy and well drilled quintet.

Practice will not start until the middle of November and the call for turn-outs will probably be November 18.
