UMATILLA BOYS IN ARMY

When the United States Army Transport St. Mihiel sails through the Golden Gate at San Francisco enroute to Hawaii on November 13, at least two Umatilla young men will be aboard according to an announcement made today by Major H. D. Bagnall, the Army Recruiting Officer, 323 New Post Office Bldg., Portland.

The young men are Richard Orlin Lane, son of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert G. Lane, and Lorren George Montgomery, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Montgomery, both of Umatilla. Major Bagnall said.

Information received from the Recruiting Officer reveals that the new soldiers will spend the first two years of their enlistment period in Hawaii, while the remaining year of their service will be spent at some army post in the United States.

Both young men were originally accepted through the Pendleton Recruiting Office, and after passing the final examinations at Vancouver Barracks, Wash., were enlisted on October 23rd for service in the Coast Artillery Corps in Hawaii.


Major Bagnall also states that this is one of the most desirable assignments in the entire army and that applications for service in Hawaii far exceeds the quotas received by his office.
