tery and one on the lawn of a school which occupied a full block. There was plenty of gasoline at ten and eleven cents, but we bought the best grade.

Passing into Louisiana we began to see sugar cane fields and the crop was being harvested and taken to large mills. Here we followed the Huey Long highway and crossed several Long bridges. At Baton Rouge we saw the capital building

which is a monument to Huey Long, towering above all other buildings in the city.

Louisiana and Mississippi are about the same. Here we saw our first baled hay, cut on the low lands. It is a wild grass and is baled in fifty pound bales and as hairy as a porcupine. There is no herd law in this country and the stock feeds on the highway. Here we saw razor back hogs which would be killed for runts if one of our farmers found them in his herd. Their snouts are as long as their bodies, but they say they are built that way so they can drink water out of a pine stump.

"When we entered Louisiana the tax on gasoline jumped three cents and you received a token with every five cent purchase—but someone has to pay for the improvements.

"Along the gulf coast in Alabama the landscape is beautiful, making a setting for the many wonderful modern homes. Fishing and shrimp canning is quite an industry at Baton Rouge. Here we saw the Satsuma orange, said to be grown no other place in the United States, and it is

the best orange I have ever eaten. Charlie Best of Hermiston can tell you about them because I understand he grew them when he lived here.

"As we entered Florida we enjoyed the sunshine for the first time since we left Salt Lake, and it was as warm as the day we left Hermiston.

"Jacksonville is a beautiful city with the residential district lined with 25 foot pavement and the homes surrounded by shrubbery and palm trees.

"I have not tried the fishing yet but expect to soon and will report later. They tell me the fish are here and all one has to do is catch them—Nuf said."
